


LIVE MUSIC IN THE AQUARIUM


MICROPLASTIC SAMPLING

Our quest for data continues! Join us for our monthly microplastic surveys as we continue to learn about the distribution and composition of microplastics on our local beaches.

May 24, 10:45 am, meet at the Wickaninnish Beach, Kwisis Centre parking lot

Wear clothes that are weather appropriate and that you won't mind getting a bit sandy. Gumboots are helpful but not required.



DESCENDING DEVICES

Send that fish down! Rockfish are prone to barotrauma when pulled up from depth. The decrease in pressure causes their swim bladder (an air-filled organ) and eyes to inflate. Fish with these symptoms are unable to return to depth on their own and will die floating at the surface. If returned to depth, however, their chances of survival increase. Descending devices can be used to do just this. By clipping a descending device to the lip of the fish and setting the proper depth gauge, fish can be lowered to the appropriate pressure and released.

The Aquarium now has Seaqualizer descending devices for sale in our gift shop. We have standard (to 150 ft) and deep water (to 300 ft) models. To encourage responsible fishing practices we are selling them at cost (\$68) plus tax.
